

In a more recent development in that same area, we now have a new location opening soon in Anniston for the Residential School in the region.

Moving farther south, Heather Fulford is now supervising the GIBS clinics across the state, with a new clinic at Troy University opening soon. And the excitement in Mobile is that we have "broken ground" on a new multipurpose building. The former warehouse will provide for office spaces, modern employee training areas, a large activity room for our students, and a fully equipped commercial kitchen. We appreciate the work of Ben Cummings of the Cummings Architecture Corp and Persons Services Corporation in this project. Many thanks to Operations Director, Ben Rogers, for his leadership in this project.

And last, but not least, Payton Thomas and Maddie Wise Robin joined our Resource Development team earlier this year. Payton will be working with the Tallassee/Montgomery and Birmingham areas and Maddie will be working in the Mobile area.

"The Learning Tree is excited to announce that we have officially "broken ground" on our new multi-purpose building in Mobile. We are transforming an old warehouse into a state of the art multi-purpose building that will contain office spaces that promote a team atmosphere, modern training spaces for our employees, a large activity room for our students, and a fully-equipped commercial kitchen. The new Jacksonville Square hiring and training facility is an exciting addition to The Learning Tree. This facility is located at 28 Public Square West in Jacksonville and offers visibility and convenience for applicants and new hires.



Students and staff in the Jacksonville region will soon be moving to a more centralized location at 301 EA Darden Drive in Anniston. This school location will open this summer.



The Birmingham regional office moved to this new location at 120 Yeager Pkway in Pelham in early 2022 following a flood at the previous building. The previous location was repaired and is being used for residential programs and offices.

Growing Independence Behavioral Services

The Learning Tree is serving approximately 40 preschool and school age clients across our clinics in Anniston, Birmingham, Mobile and Montgomery, with plans to serve up to 50 clients by the end of 2022. We are in the process of developing a 5th clinic at the Troy University Montgomery Campus.

The Learning Tree was awarded \$20,000 from the Healthcare Workers Compensation Fund. Over the last yeat we have been developing improvements in our fleet management and driver training. With these funds we will begin the next steps in the overhaul, which will include:

the installation and implementation of Samsara's comprehensive fleet management tools. These tools include: Dual-Facing Dash Cameras, "Gateways" that will connect to the vehicle's computer to report live GPS location and speed, fuel consumption, and other vehicle analytics, panic buttons that are able to be used in emergency situations, and their fleet and driver management software for oversight of our fleet. We are very excited about this progress which will directly impact the safety of individuals in our care, our staff, and our vehicles. We are extremely thankful to our Healthcare Worker's Compensation Fund partners who recognized the steps we have been taking to improve the safety of our staff and individuals in our care. Family Support Services

According to the National Institute of Health, parents and caregivers of individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder frequently experience higher levels of stress and poorer physical health when compared to parents and caregivers of typically developing individuals. They are at an elevated risk of developing caregiver syndrome and experiencing depression, stress, and anxiety. Siblings of individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder are more likely to be withdrawn and have poor social skills. Research has shown that the challenges that individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder face can negatively impact parent and family functioning. Family therapy, while it may not automatically solve family conflicts or make unpleasant situations go away, it can help family members understand one another better and provide them the skills to cope with challenging situations.

The Learning Tree offers family support services across the state of Alabama to families with individuals with severe developmental disabilities, including Autism Spectrum Disorder. Individual support sessions, which are open to the community, are available with Dr. Jim Jeffers by phone, email, or video conferencing. Parent groups sessions are also available.

Potential benefits for parents are:

- To gain insights into the developmental stages of their child.
- Benefit from a professional that will listen in an accepting manner.
- Joys and frustrations can be shared without judgement.
- When in crisis, strategies can be suggested on how to keep the family together.
- · Learn family coping skills.
- Practical helpful hints for working with their child and siblings.
